Job Board Searches and Clicks

→ Last week, search activity fell by 13% and click activity decreased by 9%.

Spot Freight Market

- → Overall average spot rates (including fuel) decreased by 2¢ per mile from the previous week.
- \rightarrow Total load postings fell by 6% WoW.
- \rightarrow Overall truck availability was up by 2% WoW.

Story of the Week

America needs more professional drivers.

- → The American Trucking Association estimates the current industry shortage to be 80,000 drivers, and expects it to double by 2030.
- → This shortage comes amid increasing demand for freight, backlogs in licensing and training and an aging workforce.
 - While the average age of new drivers is 35, the average age of all drivers is 47, which means the rate of incoming recruits is not high enough to offset coming retirees.





This Week in Spot Freight

Van segment rates still not showing seasonal strength.²

Overall spot rates (including fuel) were down 2¢ the previous week. Dry Van: -2¢ WoW | Refrigerated: +3¢ WoW | Flatbed: Flat -3¢ WoW

- → Rates 14% below the same week of 2021
- → 9% below the five-year average
- → Rates excluding fuel surcharge were 27% below the same week of 2021


Total load volume decreased by 6% from the previous week.

Dry Van: -6% WoW | Refrigerated: +13% WoW | Flatbed: -15% WoW

- → Down 46% compared to same week of 2021
- → 4% below the five-year average
- Only West Coast and Mountain Central regions increased WoW, with the West Coast once again leading volume gains

Overall truck availability increased by 2% from the previous week.

Story of the Week

The ATA estimates the current industry shortage to be 80,000 drivers, and expects it to double by 2030!

Average age of a new truck driver is 35

- Average age of all currently working drivers is 47
- This disparity means there are not enough new young drivers entering the profession to offset retirees

→ The ATA has outlined a strategy to combat the issue

- Enact legislation to lower the eligible age for a Commercial Driver's License from 21 to 18
- Add truck driving electives and apprenticeship programs to high schools
- Expand work visas to those drivers from other countries who qualify

Story of the Week (continued)

In addition to the strategies outlined by the ATA fleets could try:

- Growing female recruitment
 - Women make up 47% of the U.S. workforce but only 6% of truck drivers
- Look to the military
 - Many discharged U.S. veterans are experienced truck drivers, so fleets could benefit by offering an express hiring route for vets to entice them
- Promote technological changes
 - Highlight and showcase the cutting-edge technological advantages today's trucking has to offer
- Rebrand the trucker lifestyle
 - Younger generations want to be a part of something and aren't just looking for a paycheck or the independence older drivers craved
 - Attract younger drivers by framing truck driving as a service-oriented industry to highlight how the profession serves a vital purpose
