Rail strike back on the table, this time for December

- → The nation's largest rail union, SMART Transportation Division, declined Monday a contract proposal in part brokered by the White House, putting the potential of a national railroad strike back on the table next month.
- → SMART-TD could strike Dec. 9, or the rail carriers could lock out workers, unless Congress steps in.



This Week in Spot Freight

Dry van spot rate strength continues in the holiday week.²

Overall spot rates (including fuel) were down 2¢ the previous week. Dry Van: +7¢ WoW | Refrigerated: -5¢ WoW | Flatbed: Flat -1¢ WoW

- → 16% Below the same week of 2021
- → 6% Above the five-year average

Total load volume decreased by 45% from the previous week.

Dry Van: -41% WoW | Refrigerated: -43% WoW | Flatbed: -52% WoW

- → 49% Below the same week of 2021
- → 25% Below the five-year average
- → Declines were relatively uniform across all regions due to the holiday week

Overall truck availability fell by 26% from the previous week.

- → Ratio of loads-to-trucks fell to its lowest ratio since May 2020
- → While the ratio of loads-to-trucks was much lower than typical since lockdowns began, the number is still slightly above the average weekly Market Demand Index in 2019

Story of the Week

The Railroad Strike is BACK ON???

→ A railroad strike was avoided this past September

- Talks were extended and it was thought an agreement would be reached
- After a narrow vote a strike could be back on the table
 just in time for Christmas
- SMART Transportation Division, the nation's largest rail union, rejected a proposal partly brokered by the White House
 - Following record turnout for the vote, the union, which represents 28,000 conductors turned the deal down by the slimmest of margins
 - 0.8% of union voters rejected the deal

- The second largest rail union, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen, voted in favor of the deal
 - The conductors union and engineers union make up about half of the unionized labor force, but the 12 unions involved adhere to what is referred to as a "me too" policy
 - Under these conditions, the terms agreed to by the last hold out would trickle down and be applied to all the others
 - If all 12 unions can't reach an agreement, they may go on strike

Story of the Week (continued)

- The last railroad strike was in 1991, and lasted until a day before Congress was to step in
 - The following year, a walkout by members of the International Association of Machinists spread nationally and lasted for two days before Congress had to intervene
 - SMART Transportation Division could strike on December 9th, or rail carriers could lock out workers, unless an agreement is reached or Congress once again steps in
- The losses for a railroad strike could potentially top \$2 Billion a day
 - The ATA estimates the U.S. would need an additional 460,000 long-haul trucks every day to offset the loss of the 7,000 daily freight trains - which is simply NOT possible
